

FOREWORD FROM ADBA CHAIR





The last year brought important wins for the AD and biogas industry in the UK. While the International Energy Agency (IEA)'s World Energy Outlook increased growth projections for the biogas industry to a range of 8% to 22% per year until 2030, following the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the total installed biogas capacity in the UK grew by 17.3%.

The UK sector's impressive growth, towards the top end of the IEA's range, means that we are on track to overtake the nuclear sector in terms of energy output during the 2030s. Moreover, biomethane can be easily stored, providing a "big green battery" to back up energy use in the winter when there is no solar at peak hours, and sometimes little wind either.

Most importantly, wins on policy hold out the hope of greater growth in the coming years. The long-awaited publication of the Government response to the consultation on Consistency in Recycling in England confirmed new requirements for local authorities in England to provide weekly food waste collections for households and businesses by end of March 2026 and March 2025 respectively. Adding to the reasons for optimism, Government reiterated AD is the preferred recycling technology for food waste. ADBA has stepped up its engagement with Local Authorities to ensure the new stream of food waste comes online as quickly as possible to address feedstocks competition.

The extension of the Green Gas Support Scheme (GGSS) to 31st March 2028 allayed industry's concerns of a hiatus between the GGSS and post-GGSS support, but we continue to press for support without artificial end dates which hamper investment. In addition, the publication of the critical call for evidence on the Future Policy Framework for Biomethane Production signalled that Government has taken on board ADBA's calls for a more holistic approach to support mechanisms to grow the sector.

Ahead of the general election, ADBA met with key Labour figures, such as Kerry McCarthy, now minister at the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNZ) and Daniel Zeichner, now minister at Department for Environment, Food & Rural Affairs (Defra). We presented ADBA's 10-point Roadmap, which calls for targeted Government support

to address current barriers to growth and details how AD can address issues ranging from energy security and clean waterways to achieving net zero and providing diversified income streams for farmers. Ultimately, the roadmap calls for a new target of a 1,000 new biogas plants across the UK, including in rural and deprived areas, by 2030. We have requested follow up meetings with the newly appointed ministers and sent letters to all new Secretaries of State, Ministers of State and Junior Ministers of all AD's key departments: DESNZ, Defra and Department for Transport (DfT).

We need the new Government to demonstrate greater ambition for the sector than the previous administration to ensure we do not lag behind the biogas market in the EU. In the EU, biogas grew by 37% last year following the European Commission's ambitious target to achieve a ten-fold increase in production by 2030. In engaging with the new Government, we will focus on both quick wins and more ambitious policy asks to secure renewed momentum for the UK sector. We will also aim to create a narrative for the key role of biogas in a net zero world as an always available dispatchable resource, most needed when power demand is high (for example winter evenings) but intermittent output from wind and solar is low or negligible. The message is simple: there is no net zero without biogas.

The ADCS Certification scheme has been revised and updated to better support the industry, considering best practices and available technologies globally. The scheme now has 11 modules with a dedicated module to Biomethane and Life Cycle Assessment. The scheme is now available to different sectors related to the biogas industry, such as industrial and municipal organic waste, wastewater treatment, agricultural plants and others. ADBA's Operational Guide Notes will support operators to achieve the Scheme. The ADCS has a new audit mechanism to enable participation for all Biogas Plants in the UK on a flightpath to full accreditation.

- At the National Conference, ADBA also launched its AD Interactive Election Map detailing the location and capacity of every AD Plant in the UK and colour-coded constituencies according to how likely they were to 'swing' at the election. The map supported our lobbying in the run-up to the election and will be invaluable in securing site visits for the newly elected MPs
- In March 2024, Chris Huhne, ADBA Chair, spoke at Low Carbon Agriculture Show to highlight the potential of AD to decarbonise agriculture
- In March 2024, Flávio Ascenco, ADBA Technical Support Manager, spoke at the National Food Waste Conference about AD as the optimal technology to recycle unavoidable food waste
- Ahead of General Election, ADBA engaged early with key Labour figures, such as Kerry McCarthy, Shadow Minister for Climate, Daniel Zeichner, Shadow Minister for Farming, and Ruth Jones, Shadow Minister for Waste, to highlight the sector's potential. In meetings with Kerry McCarthy and Daniel Zeichner, Chris Huhne, ADBA's Chair, and Giulia Ceccarelli, Head of External Affairs, presented ADBA's 10-point roadmap. These meetings were essential to secure support from the new Government and its decision-makers.
